July is the Month of Saint James our Patron Santiago! His feast falls on July 25. Celebrations are usually scheduled for the nearest weekend in Mora and Villanueva. He is also patron of those who suffer from rheumatism, hatmakers, ranchers, for the sowing of fields and he will return your lost or stolen animals. Remember though he is the one to turn to against intolerance. Remember that he has defended the Spanish and the Pueblo Indians through the last four centuries from attack by outsiders. He has been sighted in New Mexico on numerous occasions, when we were in most need of help, beginning with the Battle of Acoma. Although he is celebrated widely in New Mexico, there is no church nor chapel dedicated to this special New Mexico Saint. Pray for his continued protection and blessings!

220 Year-old Spanish Colonial Adobe/Terron, San Antonio Mission Church on North Los Lentos Road in Los Lunas, of the San Clemente Parish, has been determined essentially sound but faces serious threats due to drainage issues and moisture entrapment that had the potential to deteriorate the adobe and damage the structure. Originally constructed in 1789, it has been restored and modified several times over the centuries, where some of the changes and uses of modern materials causing problems for the original adobe blocks. Last Fall, the Church was closed. Now the restoration has begun and the parish must raise about \$200,000. to fund the restorations. The annual June 12 feast day of San Antonio was again celebrated in the community this year. Many supports have come forth from the community and those who appreciate the artistic value held in this Spanish Colonial Church.

Featured Speaker: Francisco Sisneros Topic: "The Three Burials of the Venerable Fray Geronimo de la Lallana". The Salinas Jurisdiction of 17th century New Mexico was a mystical and enchanting place. This is where Fray Geronimo's death and burial in the church of La Purisima Concepcion de Quarai began a series of events leading to his final interment a century later. Fray Geronimo served at Salinas from 1634 until his death in 1659. This presentation will explain de la Lallana's interments as well as miracles and post mortem apparitions reported by Pueblo natives and Spanish settlers.

Book Review: "***Architects of the Culture of Death***", by Donald DeMarco and Benjamin Wiker. This cameo account is about the personalities who have served as architects, the master-builders of the culture we live in today. This most interesting book details personal biographical information on how the half truths, innuendo, and carefully placed academic fabrications craftily woven together, have artfully worked on destroying reason, logic and life. Much of what the Christian culture has built and contributed through the centuries, based at minimum on the ten commandments. In the *Didache* (The teachings of the twelve Apostles) is an initiation manual for converts telling what Christian holiness demanded, and consequently what we must leave behind from the pagan culture. The very pagan practices of Rome, have somehow become part of contemporary culture again. Biographical details help one look further into the lives that shaped our values/culture: 1) The Will Worshippers; Schopenhauer, Nietzsche, Rand 2) The Eugenic Evolutionists; Darwin Galton, Haeckel, 3) The Secular Utopianists; Marx

Galton, Haeckel, 4) The atheistic Existentialists; Sarte, deBeauvoir, Badinter, 5) The Pleasure Seekers; Freud, Reich, Gurley-Brown, 6) The Sex Planners; Mead, Kinsey, Sanger, Gamble, Guttmacher, 7) The Death Peddlers; Kevorkian, Humphry, Singer. Final conclusions are provided on Personalism and the Culture of Life. This book provides a complex look at our culture today. A most worthwhile read.

Novena July 4-11, Masses will be held at 6AM and 5:15PM daily.

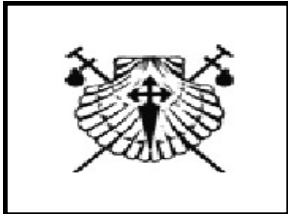
