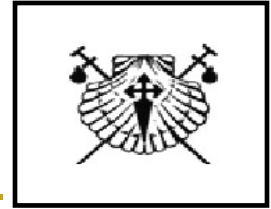

The invitation and meeting was to discuss the possibility of organizing and designating/identifying, by County, local Historian(s), that would serve as resources and contacts for anyone wanting historic information or assistance about that region of New Mexico. Of interest, was that among the many historians gathered, the only Hispanics in attendance were members of HCPL. It seemed to me that the significant story of Spanish New Mexico, through the fine work of the NM Humanities Council, will continue to be less in volume and degree, as long as we native Hispanos (who have an interest in our history), are not involved with the NMHC, in addition to the other organizations in which we participate. Presently the NMHC seeks Board Members to serve three year terms. They also serve on committees, assist with fundraising and contribute expertise and energy to the activities of NMHC.

In attending the meeting, I learned that Congress supports funding to the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) for state humanities councils, and that \$40.3 million is provided directly to state councils. An annual grant from NEH supports grants for programs in local communities, for speakers, and living history performers in every corner of New Mexico. If interested go to: www.nmhum.org

StoryCorps llega en el Centro Nacional de Cultural Hispana en Alburquerque.

StoryCorps, una organización con el propósito de preservar la diversidad de las tradiciones y valores culturales de las comunidades de origen Hispano y Latino en todo el país, dicha organización está realizando la grabación de historias reales de gente común para luego difundirlas en su página web o —como en el caso de Nuevo México— a través de entidades radiales que colabran con el proyecto. El estudio móvil que estará estacionado en el Centro Nacional de Cultura Hispana durante seis semanas, desde el 20 de mayo hasta 25 de Juno. Los organizadores del proyecto “Historias” tienen planificado recopiar 120 entrevistas durante su estadía en Alburquerque. Las sesiones de grabación de los testimonios duran aproximadamente 40 minutos y generalmente son realizadas entre dos familiares o amigos, los mismos que son asistidos por el personal de StoryCorps. Las reservas están abiertas al público desde y se pueden hacer a través de la línea **1.800.850.4406, o en la página web StoryCorps.org.** también questa \$25.00 para grabar cada Historia.

StoryCorps arrives at the National Hispanic Cultural Center in Alburquerque.

StoryCrops, a nonprofit organization whose purpose is to promote and preserve the diversity of Hispanic and Latino communities’ traditions and cultural values throughout the country seek your story! Recording real stories from ordinary people that will later be broadcast on their website or radio stations collaborating with the project is part of the project. Their mobile studio, will record approximately 120 stories from May 20 through June 20 of approximately 40 minutes in length. The recordings will be made available for broadcasting locally to KUNM-FM and also posted on their web at www.storycorps.org as well as put into the national archives. You can see their mobile recording studio parked next to the Disney Center, a converted silver Airstream trailer, where most of the recordins will take place, parked at the National Hispanic Cultural Center at Fourth Street and Avenida César Chávez. N.M. Humanities Council Awards over \$69,000.00 in Grants

Four times a year, NMHC accepts grant applications for local projects; in addition they provide speakers and living history presenters to not-for-profit organizations, museums, libraries, and schools throughout the state.

NMHC has funded several projects commemorating the NM Centennial of Statehood. Funding comes also from the NM Department of Cultural Affairs and donations.

The following have been granted:

- ▶ \$10,000 to the SW Research & Info. Ctr for *Enduring Legacies: Food and Culture in Southern NM since 1912*.
- ▶ \$2,700 to the Fray Angélico Chávez History Library, Santa Fe, for “My Penitente Lan: 100th birthday of Fray Angélico.
- ▶ \$3,265 to the Museum of Spanish Colonial Art for the *Converging Streams Symposium*.
- ▶ \$5,439 to the International Space Hall of Fame Foundation, NM Museum of Space History, Alamogordo, for *NM Space Trails*.
- ▶ \$6,460 to the Lama Foundation *Oral History and Memory for Llama Genesis/Lama Incarnations*.
- ▶ \$6,292 to the Institute for Medieval Studies, UNM for *Love in the Middle Ages*.

On Line Atlas of Historic New Mexico

Maps: The NM Humanities Council launch the *Centennial Online Atlas of Historic New Mexico Maps*. The Atlas offers 20 maps, embedded in a Google maps interface. The collections spans NM History from the explorations of Fray Marcos to the rise of the automobile tourist and is sorted into four thematic eras. Features such as:

- overview pages placing the maps in historical context
- timelines of events depicted in the maps, and audio of NM humanities scholars discussing trends of each era.
- a dynamic map interface that allows for close examination of the maps, as well as panning, zooming, and resizing annotated points, which can be clicked to reveal the stories of the people in N.M. at the time of the map’s creation using the “print” button to get a printable handout of the map clicking bibliographic links at the end of quotations comparing historic maps to modern maps by clicking the “Today” button.

Registered users can access further features, some created at teachers requests for more interactive computer-based tools, to engage a wired generation with history, where students can research their own community history and culture. 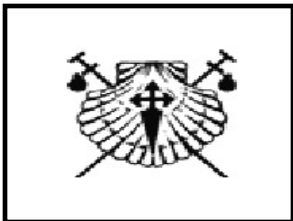
