






Mom's Beans with Chicos

2 cups beans. 1cup chicos. water to fill 2 quart pot, half tbsp lard,

Guizo: 1 tbsp lard, 1 tsp onion, 1 tbsp flour, Salt to taste

Clean (remove rocks and detritus) and add to a bean pot two cups of pinto beans and one cup of chicos. Add about half a tablespoon of lard to prevent boiling over and to permit the bean pot to be covered. This will prevent the beans from becoming dark. Fill to the top with water, bring to a boil, lower heat for a slow boil and cover pot with lid completely. Cook for about five hours at a steady boil. Check and stir often to prevent beans from burning (add boiling water as needed). When beans are cooked, prepare a guizo of one tablespoon of lard and add one teaspoonful of chopped onion until onion is clear. Add one tablespoon of flour until flour darkens slightly. Add to beans and continue cooking a little longer (perhaps 15 minutes) until thickened. Beans can be cooked alone. Some add a chile pepper to the pot. Salt to taste. Serves eight adults. **Ricardo Quintana**

DIEGO ARCHULETA (3/27/1814-3/21/1884

Diego Archuleta, as a boy went to Durango, Nuevo Espania with (Fr.) Antonio Jose Martinez to study for priesthood. In his eight years education he received four minor orders requisite for becoming a priest but it was not to be his vocation. He graduated from the Chapultepec Military Academy in Mexico City and followed a military career. In 1840 the Mexican government commissioned him captain of the New Mexico militia. When Texas invaded NM he commanded a body of troops and assisted in the capture of the Texans. The Texans then hated and remembered this New Mexican. In 1843 he was elected a deputy to the National Mexican Congress from New Mexico, and served with honor for two years. In recognition of his Distinguished services as an officer of the Mexican army he was decorated with the golden Cross of Honor and presented with a diploma or certificate declaratory of his valiant conduct in preserving the integrity of Mexican territory.

When the United States of America invaded the small villages of New Mexico Diego Archuleta counseled The governer Manuel Armijo to accept the terms of surrender sparing NM of needless bloodshed and destruction of their food supplies. For a Catholic to go to war "there must be serious prospects of success". 1

Governer Bent added Diego's name to a list of influential people he feared could give him trouble and wanted locked up. When the army went to his country home to arrest him his neighbers gathered around his house preventing his arrest. Colonel Price later avenged the hatred of the Texans by burning Diego's home in los Luceros to ashes destroying the finest private library in all New Mexico. The people arrested on the list were later released due to a lack of evidence.

In 1857 Colonel Archuleta was United States Indian agent for the Southern Utes and the Apaches, which position he held for five years. In 1861 he was placed at the head of a regiment of auxiliaries, with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, and was stationed for a time at Fort Union, and again, Abraham Lincoln, appointed him Indian agent for the Utes, Apaches and Jicarrillas. In the same year he was commissioned brigadier general by Governor Henry Connelly. For fourteen years he was a member of the legislative assembly of the Territory of New Mexico. He was a candidate for Thirtythe seventh Congress of the States. He was the first man to transport a family carriage across the Great Plains. He was the son of Juan Andres Archuleta, a prominent and wealthy citizen of Rio Arriba, and Margarita Antonia Lucero de Godoy, in 1841 was married to Jesusita Trujillo, and there were seven children of this union. He died at Santa Fe, while a member of the Legislative Assembly of 1884, of heart failure. On the 20th

of March, while engaged in his duties as a member of the legislature, on the floor of the house, he was taken suddenly ill. He was taken to the home of don Rafael Lopez, where he was stopping, and on the following day rallied considerably, and a very important measure being under consideration in the House he was assisted to his accustomed seat in order to cast his vote. He remained only long, enough to perform this duty and was taken to his apartments, where the utmost care and attention were shown him; every known medical treatment was brought to bear on his case but, despite all efforts he continued to sink and grow worse until death came to his relief. The House of Representatives met and adjourned after passing appropriate resolutions and designating proper committees to look after the details of the funeral obsequies. The council also met and passed similar resolutions. His remains were removed to the hall of the society of St. Francis: thence they were taken to the Church of our Lady of Guadalupe, where mass was said, when they were again removed to the St. Francis Hall, being finally taken to the hall of the House of Representatives, where they lay in state until the day of the funeral. On the day of the funeral native and American citizens alike assembled in vast numbers, performing the last honor to the distinguished statesman. The Procession which followed the remains to their last resting place in the Catholic cemetery was one of the largest ever seen in the city²

New Charter School Proposed to NMPED

A proposal has been submitted requesting approval of a new charter school called

<u>TIERRA ADENTRO</u>: The New Mexico School of Academics, Art and Artesanía

(TANM) The mission of Tierra Adentro is to create a focus on academics, art, artisanship and the study of the cultures that comprise our rich New Mexican heritage to ensure awareness, preservation, and progression of our cultural legacy. The goal is to facilitate the understanding and practical applications of New Mexico's cultural roots and traditions. To address the critical need for generational continuity of New Mexican culture.

By focusing on the diffusion of Spanish culture as an overarching theme, this refers to the cultures that resulted from contact with the New World. The approach is to provide a deeper understanding of Spanish Culture and its role in New Mexico which will serve as a basis for the study of our cultures. TANM proposed location is downtown Albuquerque and will serve grades six through 12, and enroll a total student population of 430.

M9 Marker

Dr. Wesley Sutton, whose advanced degrees are in Molecular Biology and Physical Anthropology, visited Albuquerque in August, '09. He presented the findings of his DNA project regarding the Y (male) chromosome. (The Y chromosome is found only in males and contains some 600 markers.)

This scientific investigation was intended to compare the DNA of the male Y chromosome found in "Spanish American" "Hispano" males around New Mexico and in southern Colorado with the DNA of males from European Spain and Portugal.

Dr. Sutton's project discovered that 66.2% of "Spanish American" (so labeled by the men involved in this study) males from New Mexico and southern Colorado carried the (basic) European marker known as M9. Males from Spain and Portugal carried the (European) M9 marker at the rate of 64.6%. In other words, 66.2% of Hispano New Mexicans have ancestry that comes out of Europe (various countries) while 64.6% of (European) Spaniards and Portuguese have ancestry that comes out of Europe.

Dr. Sutton's research on this DNA project also discovered that 9.8% of male Hispano New Mexicans have Middle East (various countries) ancestry and 6.8% have North African (various countries) ancestry.



In part as celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, this issue will be discussed more fully at Hispanic Forum VI, Saturday October 10, starting at 10:30 a.m., Special Collections Library, Albuquerque.
